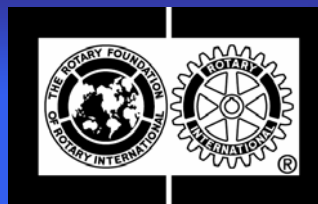

The excitement was palpable as Rotarians, Peace Fellows and university representatives exchanged ideas, experiences and expertise regarding their work to create a more peaceful world. Keynote speakers included Gillian Sorensen, Senior Advisor to the United Nations Foundation, and TRF Trustee Chairman Luis Vicente Giay.

AMBASSADORIAL SCHOLARSHIPS AND ROTARY GRANTS FOR UNIVERSITY TEACHERS

Regional Scholar Orientation Seminars

Over 100 Ambassadorial Scholars, Rotary World Peace Fellows and 150 Rotarians attended Regional Scholar Seminars in Valley Forge, PA, USA (2 & 3 June 2007), Tampa, Florida (23-24 June) and Seattle, Washington (22-24 June 2007). The next regional Scholar Seminar scheduled to take place in Sao Paulo, Brazil on 20-21 July, will actually be the first for the 2007-08 Rotary Year. There will then be no seminars scheduled to take place until Bournemouth, England (28-30 September 2007), Valley Forge, PA, USA (14-15 September 2007) and in Worcester, MA USA (28-29 September 2007).

As always, RRFCs are encouraged to support and attend the scholar seminars in their regions if they are available to do so. RRFCs are also encouraged to work with Scholarship Chairs in their respective regions to possibly develop or expand existing seminars. 2007-08 Host Counselor Appointments Still Needed

Scholarships staff are continuing their work on requests for host counselor appointments for the Ambassadorial Scholars and Rotary Grants for University Teachers recipients who will study/teach during the 2007-08 Rotary year. Information on the scholars/teachers assigned to each district is being sent this month electronically to District Governors-elect, Scholarship Subcommittee Chairpersons, and if necessary to the District Foundation Chairs. Each district that has not yet informed TRF of their host counselor assignments is requested to do so by **30 July 2007**.

RRFC's can remind districts they work with that appointing committed Rotarians to this volunteer position ensures that Rotarians will guide the scholars/university teachers in scheduling presentations at Rotary club meetings and working on Rotary service projects. Without active Rotarian involvement in the stewardship of scholarship/grant awards, it is difficult for scholars and university teachers to fulfill their ambassadorial responsibilities and the scholarship/grant becomes merely a funding source for study/teaching abroad. 2007-08 Ambassadorial Scholar Awards

Scholarships staff have begun to calculate and distribute payments to Rotarian Host Counselors for 2007-08 scholars who have begun their studies as of 1 July 2007. RRFC's are encouraged to ensure that all appointed host counselors are aware that they may be receiving scholarship payments for incoming scholars to their districts. Host Counselors will receive notice of incoming payments from Scholarships Staff.

Scholarships Fund Pool for Low-Income Countries

All districts, both high and low-income, are encouraged to donate *any* amount of DDF to the fund pool as they plan their DDF spending for program year 2008-09. All districts and each low-income country within a district may submit scholarship applications to compete for up to **32** Ambassadorial Scholarships awarded annually through the fund pool. All applications are considered on a world-competitive basis by a Trustee-appointed committee. The deadline to submit applications is the same as for all 2008-09 Ambassadorial Scholarship applications: **1 October 2007**. GROUP STUDY EXCHANGE

2006-07 Final Report Submission

A Group Study Exchange is not complete without submission of the final report. Each team member (including team leader) of the group is responsible for submitting a report on their participation in the program. TRF urges districts to send in their GSE final reports **via e-mail** including pictures. Reports should be submitted directly to the GSE coordinator at TRF within **2 months** of the team's return to the sponsor district. The GSE chair should also send copies of this report to the subcommittee's members and governor of the sponsor district and partner district. The reports should be 2-4 pages and mention both the highlights of the team's experiences and suggestions for improvement for the host district and the program. Refer to the Final Report form found in the back of the Program Guide for Rotarians (Pub #165) and the Team Handbook (Pub #164) for final report template.

Reimbursements for 2006-07

GSE Chairs are reminded that requests for reimbursements from the 2006-07 program year should be sent to the GSE Coordinators at TRF **within two months** of the incurred expenditures. Payments are issued within 15 business days from the day they are received at TRF if documentation and receipts are complete.

2008-09 Pairing options:

The 2008-09 District Governors should be on their way to securing a GSE partner district for the 2008-09 program year. District applications have already been sent out by mail and electronically to all District Governor-elects. The completed applications must be submitted to TRF by **1 October 2007**. The GSE District Application form is also available on the TRF website for easy download at <http://www.rotary.org/newsroom/downloadcenter/pdfs/167en.pdf> in English. Failure to submit the district GSE application on time can limit the chances of securing a district's first choice GSE partner. If districts need assistance in contacting potential GSE partners, they can contact their GSE coordinator at TRF.

ALUMNI RELATIONS

Rotary Centers for International Studies

Nidhi Khosla was sponsored by District 3010 (India) to study at the Rotary Center at Duke University/University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill as a Rotary World Peace Fellow from 2005-07. She will begin her Ph.D. studies in public health at Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore in the fall. Nidhi received full funding for five years of study from the university. She was fortunate to have received the similar offers from other prestigious universities, but the program at Johns Hopkins offered the best fit. This Ph.D. opportunity will allow her to continue to work toward her goals of exploring HIV, AIDS and gender issues as part of community health programs and bringing field experience to policy planning initiatives.

Rotary Peace and Conflict Studies

Ramnarayan Gagrani was sponsored by District 3130 (India) to participate in the Rotary Peace and Conflict Studies Program at Chulalongkorn University, January 2007. He works for the Government of Maharashtra, Latur as Deputy Collector (Election) where he helps maintain peaceful, free, and fair Parliamentary and Assembly elections as well as supervising local self-

government elections. After completing the Peace and Conflict Studies Program, Mr. Gagrani states, “[I improved my] ability to rethink and refashion existing practices of development of my area by innovative ideas and techniques. In the future I will act as an agent for peace building and forming network, developing my institution in my region as a source of conflict resolution and [increasing] awareness in people, inspiring them in their work, and developing a culture of peace.”

Ambassadorial Scholarships

Project Patagonia provides educational support for school children in Argentina and was established by TRF alumni. It provides school supplies and nutritional support at two schools in rural Argentina to improve the quality and efficacy of the education system for low-income students. They are also constructing a multi-media library to meet both short and long-term educational needs where the schools promote literacy, intellectual curiosity, and cross-cultural understanding. This project was organized by four scholars who studied in Buenos Aires during the 2005-06 academic year: Kimberly Berls, sponsored by the Rotary Club of Kent, Ohio, USA (District 6630) to study at Universidad de Belgrano, Emily Pierce, sponsored by the Rotary Club of Alexandria, Virginia, USA (District 7610) to study at Universidad de San Andres, Christopher Tepper, sponsored by the Rotary Club of Carbondale, Illinois, USA (District 6510) to study at Universidad Torcuato di Tella, and Tanner Wells, sponsored by the Rotary Club of Fargo-Moorhead AM, North Dakota, USA (District 5580) to study at Universidad de Belgrano.

Erin Raab was sponsored by the Rotary Club of Clayton-Ladue, Missouri, USA (District 6060) to study at University of Natal in Durban, South Africa in 2005-06. Finding that 9 schools near Durban had no books for children, Erin decided to try to start a library in the area with help from the Rotary Club of Pinetown (District 9270). She contacted the elementary school she attended in Minnesota about running a book drive, and they successfully gathered 40 boxes of children’s books for Erin. Christianne Wendler, also an alumna who studied in District 9270, supported the project. Christianne was sponsored by the Rotary Club of Lakeland (Minocqua), Wisconsin, USA (District 6220) to study at University of the Witwatersrand-Johannesburg in South Africa in 2002-03. She made shipments of books to be sent on the Rotary containers to the distribution center in Johannesburg where Erin could pick them up to bring to Durban.

Kenneth Jones was sponsored by the Rotary Club of Boonton, New Jersey, USA (District 7470) to study architecture at the University of Edinburgh, Scotland in 1986-87. Jones currently serves as foreign service officer after returning from Beirut, Lebanon, where he served as the Immigrant Visa Section Chief there for two years. Jones is also a licensed architect, designer, and brings over 12 years of teaching, lecturing, and strategic consulting experience to his work at the State Department. His clients include the U.S. Department of the Interior and U.S. Department of Health and Human Service. He served as the executive director for both the New York Foundation for Architecture and Peters Valley Craft Education Center.

Group Study Exchange

Dr. Terri Scandura (GSE team member, 1991-92, USA to England) was recently featured in the *Miami Herald* newspaper. Terri has been a professor at the University of Miami in Miami, Florida since 1990 and was recently named dean of the graduate school.

Nicholas Francis (GSE team member, 1997-1998, India to USA) is currently the head of a professional social work organization in Madurai, Tamilnadu, India. Nicholas became a Rotarian in January of 2003 and has been involved in club and district level committees. Recently he won the 'Best Rotary Magazine Editor Award' at the all-India Level, given to the best Rotary club bulletins in India.
